The 2019 annual meeting of the Association of the Descendants of Henry Mershon was called to order on Saturday, July 27th, at 10:15 am in the Community Meeting Room at the Lawrence Headquarters Branch of the Mercer County Library in Lawrenceville, NJ. Following an invocation, we recited the Pledge of Allegiance. Each family group introduced themselves and shared information about their Mershon family line.

Laura Nawrocik of the Mercer County Library Staff updated us on what is happening with the Mershon archives, now part of the Lawrence Township Archives located at the Mercer County Library. Genealogy Report: Mershon Genealogist Pam Caffrey was at our meeting with her laptop computer to show interested family members what is in our genealogy database for their family line. Our genealogy database has over 35,000 records of Mershon descendants and spouses, from 1685 to present (see article on page 9).

Executive Board Report: Our Board met on Friday evening, July 26th. Main items considered were -

• Board member Noel Barton has finished his paid work organizing and digitizing our Mershon archives (see article on page 8).

• We need to reestablish our Mershonassoc.com website. Our website has been offline since mid-July 2019. The computer consultant who helped Dr. Jim Mershon maintain our website is not responsive to our contacts. Dr. Jim's consultant set up our website and domain name under his account. Without his cooperation, we may need to start from the beginning.

• Board member Harrison Hunt has made some recommendations to revise our Mershon Association Constitution and Bylaws to more closely conform to IRS rules for obtaining IRS approval of 501(c)3 nonprofit tax free status. Our Executive Board did not have adequate time to carefully consider these changes at our July 26th meeting. We will tentatively bring some recommendations to our 2020 annual meeting for a vote by our membership.

• Our Mershon Association was organized in 1923. We are starting to think about a special meeting in 2023.

• We reviewed a proposed slate of nominations for our 2020 Mershon Association officers.

We voted unanimously to hold our 2020 meeting in Lawrenceville on Saturday, July 25th.

Following our tradition of passing the hat, we collected \$600. In donations for our Mershon Association. Thank you!

We adjourned our formal meeting at about 2:00 PM to travel to the circa 1740 former Houghton³ Mershon home that was owned by Mershon descendant Marie Louise "Weedie" Stokes until her passing at age 98 in 2013. This home is even more special because it is on 16 acres of land originally owned by our common ancestor, Henry Mershon II. The home is now owned by Steve and Cindy Olentine who were very hospitable in opening their home to our family members and even provided refreshments.

Our next stop was the Henry Mershon II grave site at the Lawrenceville Cemetery.

We gathered at 6:30 PM for a no-host group dinner at the Princetonian Diner on U.S. Route 1 in Lawrenceville. This event concluded our meeting.

Resetting the Henry Mershon II Headstone

On Friday, August 23, 2019 my family and I were visiting Princeton. We like to get up there every so often just to walk around, to get ice cream at the world famous "Bent Spoon" on Palmer Square, and to see some of our family history in a very historic context. We always make sure to stop by the FitzRandolph Gate for Princeton University. Our son Nate is named after its namesake, his 8th great-grandfather.

On our way home we take Route 206, or the old Kings Highway, so we can stop by the Lawrenceville Cemetery to see the Giant headstone of our ancestor Henry Mershon II. It was late in the afternoon, around dusk, as we entered the cemetery. If you have never been there, it is a small place, off a two-lane road with a sharp entrance up a hill that leads to a very narrow one lane road that loops a field about the size of a football field. Headstones are on each side as you enter, though there are none on the right side of the far side. It is on this far side that we find the headstone, actually a four-ton boulder, of Henry II. At least, that is normally where you would find it. As we drove down the far side of the cemetery, looking for the boulder we always saw, it wasn't there. How does a four ton boulder disappear? Then, as we drove up to the place where it normally stood, we found that it had fallen over.

At first I feared it was the result of malicious activity, but after getting out and looking around it appeared the concrete foundation had weakened and given way under the weight of the stone. I contacted our Mershon Association President, Clare Mershon, immediately to let him know what had happened, and to begin the process of getting the stone reset.

Working with the Lawrenceville Cemetery Association, it took some time, more than we all had hoped, to get the contractor lined up, to come up with a suitable design for the new foundation, and to arrange for the stone to be reset.

Before we reset the stone though, a unique and unexpected opportunity availed itself to us. The original Henry II headstone had been placed in the footing excavation before pouring the concrete footing in 1925 that supported the great stone. The contractor pulled this footing out of the ground. Clare then asked if I would be able to safely remove the headstone from the bottom of the footing? On a cool, clear, fall day I went up to the cemetery with as many masonry tools as I could bring up in my truck...just in case. I started by cleaning the stone off with a rough brush and worked my way down to compressed air. It became

clear that what was buried was the original headstone in two pieces. Eventually, after several hours of gentle chipping away and the occasional well placed, not so gentle shot, the two pieces separated from the concrete footing. At Clare's request I brought them to my house, where I further cleaned them and am holding them for safe keeping.

As with any job there were challenges, delays, and yes, cost overruns. But the job did get done. For the most part, from the ground up, the Stone appears as it did before it fell over. Beneath the ground level though is a fortress. Over two thousand pounds of concrete were used to set a support collar around a new foundation of another almost one thousand pounds of concrete.

Our goal was to reset the Great Stone as a unique and immovable testament to Henry Mershon II's sacrifice for his family and a symbol that his descendants have not forgotten him. I am glad to have been fortunate enough to have found Henry II's fallen stone on August 23rd. I'm glad we, as a family of families, care enough to preserve his memory and our families' traditions for these past almost 300 years. And even though 2020 is off to a bit of a rocky start, I am sure we will be able to pick ourselves up and reset ourselves in a more firm foundation with the help of our family, our friends, and our Faith.

Added note by Clare Mershon: We thank Mershon Association Vice-President Dave Beun for taking the lead in having the Henry II headstone reset. This involved several trips to Lawrenceville and several hours of on-site labor to salvage the original Henry II headstone that was partially encased in the original concrete footing. Jeff Mershon of Monroe Township, NJ, assisted by making several trips to Lawrenceville to monitor the progress of the work. Thank you to Dave and Jeff!!

Dave didn't say this in his preceeding article, but Dave mentioned to me last July that he thought the Henry II headstone was leaning. I looked at it then, but I couldn't tell it was leaning any more than in previous years. I was wrong!

Resetting the headstone/boulder turned out to be a two-stage process. When the boulder was originally set in 1925, the Mershon Association paid \$50. (equivalent to \$743. in 2020) to the Lawrenceville Cemetery Association for perpetual care. The Cemetery Association at their expense hired Stuphen Memorials to reset the boulder on a new concrete footing (see Stage 1 photo below).

As a retired civil engineer, I was concerned that the narrow unreinforced concrete collar at the base of the boulder was inadequate support (concrete is strong in compression, but relatively weak in tension). We asked Stuphen Memorials to add a steel reinforced concrete collar at our expense around their original collar (see Stage 2 photo below). The cost for this additional work was \$1,900. paid by our Mershon Association. Hopefully, this will last for the ages!

Wally is survived by his 103 year old mother Esther Merritt Riviere; wife of 60 years Nancy (Grimes) Riviere and four children: Hollie Hamlett Miller (Mark), Beau Riviere (Julie), Charlie Riviere and Tim Riviere (Becky). He was called "Pepaw" by 13 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

In 1865, Bruce's great-great-grandfather, Eli Mershon, settled in the Fort Osage area of Jackson County and purchased 160 acres shortly thereafter. The family has farmed there ever since. Thank you Noel Barton!

In February 2019, Mershon Executive Board Member Noel Barton of Farmington, Utah, completed his paid work of organizing our Mershon Archives and working with the LDS Family History Library to digitize them. Noel was particularily suited to perform this task because he is a trained genealogist, retired from the LDS Family History Library. Noel is a descendant of Rebekah³ (Mershon) FitzRandolph.

As a volunteer, Noel had previously scanned our oldest documents, family photographs and the genealogy pages from 22 Family Bibles.

This latest project has been underway part time by Noel since Joan Swearer shipped 13 record boxes to him in 2010. Up to then, most of our records had been stored for years in the attic of the Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville with no climate control. Our photographs and oldest documents were moved into two safe deposit boxes in 2006, but it was clear that the main part of our paper records would not survive indefinitely in the church attic.

The long-term solution, proposed by Noel, was to digitize our records using the facilities of the LDS Family History Library. This was a big project because our records needed to be better organized before scanning. Noel agreed to do the work at the rate of \$40. per hour. Noel's original estimate was \$4,400. Our Board authorized an additional \$2,800. in 2013. Even so, we know Noel spent extra hours on this project. Our final expenses are \$7,200.00 paid to Noel, approximately \$1,315. in shipping expenses and \$124.83 for supplies, a total of approximately \$8,640.

We are thankful that our original documents, previously in the church attic, are now part of the Lawrence Township Archives. They are stored in a climate controlled, locked room at the Lawrence Headquarters Branch of the Mercer County Library. I want to encourage Mershon descendants to join heritage organizations such as the Huguenot Society, the Descendants of Founders of New Jersey, Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and Sons of the American Revolution (SAR). These organizations have chapters in almost all states (and some foreign units). Many of the organization's local units have very interesting meetings and activities. For example, my local DAR chapter recently made an outstanding number of face masks. We also serve with the Honor Flights for veterans. We enjoy meeting people who have served our country with honor.

Membership in the Huguenot Society is based on the fact of our descending from Henri Mershon who left France for religious reasons. Membership in Descendants of Founders of New Jersey is based on the fact that we descend from Henry Mershon II who settled in New Jersey before 1700.

DAR and SAR memberships are based on our patriot ancestors who fought in or supported the Revolution. In my case my DAR membership is based on our patriot Andrew³ Mershon who owned "Andrew's Colonial Tavern". He not only supported the Revolution, but he 'housed' the troops after they crossed the river on that great Christmas crossing. Many DAR and SAR records are shared between these organizations. So, if your brother, sister or cousin is a member of one organization, their documentation of descent can be shared.

New Jersey to buy 70 acres of former Andrew Mershon farm

Elmer and Ann Smith, owners of the former Andrew Mershon Tavern, have reached an agreement with the State of New Jersey to sell 70 acres of their undeveloped farm property to the state for an expansion of the Washington Crossing State Park. Elmer expects this sale to close soon.

This sale does not include Elmer and Ann's house (the former Andrew Mershon colonial tavern) and 7.8 acres with it that are a separate parcel protected by a conservation easement. There is a strong possibility the state may purchase the house at a future date for use as a park office. However, with New Jersey and other states facing financial shortfalls due to the COVID-19 pandemic, this is not imminent.

How did the 1918 Spanish Flu Pandemic affect your family?

The current worldwide COVID-19 virus pandemic makes some of us recall family stories about the 1918 Spanish Flu pandemic that caused an estimated 50 million deaths worldwide and 675,000 in the United States. In my father's immediate family, likely everyone was sick, but my grandmother, Idella Mershon, said "I can't be sick" because she had to care for her three sons and husband, Louis Mershon. Louis said "I feel like dying" and requested a slug of whiskey to ease his pain. Perhaps the whiskey helped Louis. He and the rest of the family eventually recovered from the deadly virus. My six-year old father, Earl, did not return to school that year. When he returned to school in the fall, he took two grades to catch up.
