2023 Virtual Mershon Annual Meeting and Reunion

Our 2023 Mershon Annual Meeting and Reunion will be a virtual meeting on Zoom this year. Please join us as we meet online Saturday afternoon, July 29th, at 4:00 PM Eastern Time (3:00 PM Central Time, 2:00 PM Mountain Time, 1:00 PM Pacific Time).

We had hoped to have our 2023 meeting on a private university campus near Lawrenceville, NJ because they could offer meeting space, overnight accommodations and food service. However, we found out in late May that meeting their liability insurance requirements would be very costly. Therefore, our Executive Board decided on June 9th to have a virtual meeting this year.

We will have a short Mershon Association business meeting, followed by a Mershon history presentation. There will be time at the end of our meeting for family members to share their family history stories and show family artifacts. We will use the "Raise your Hand" feature on Zoom to individually recognize family members wanting to share their stories. We anticipate our meeting will last about 1.5 hours.

We received positive feedback from our two virtual meetings during the COVID pandemic in 2020 and 2021. There were 109 family units who viewed some or all of our 2021 virtual meeting. While we will miss the camaraderie of an in-person meeting, an online meeting allows more family members to participate.

The 2022 annual meeting of the **Association of the Descendants of Henry Mershon** was called to order on Saturday, July 23rd, at 10:15 am in the Community Meeting Room at the Lawrence Headquarters Branch of the Mercer County Library, Lawrenceville, NJ. Following a welcome and orientation, we started live streaming our meeting. After an invocation and reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, each family group present introduced themselves and shared information about their Mershon ancestry.

Treasurer Report: Joan Swearer reported on our finances. (**Update**: As of 12/31/2022. we had a checking account balance of \$3,384.98. We also have a \$10,423.51 Certificate of Deposit).

Genealogist Report: Pam Caffrey reported on our Mershon genealogy database. We have over 36,000 individual records of Mershon descendants and spouses going back to 1685. Pam is administrator of the Mershon Association Genealogy Group on Facebook (see the Mershon Genealogy article on page 8).

Heritage Organizations: Elaine Tredinnick made a presentation to encourage membership in heritage organizations. Most Mershon descendants can qualify for membership in **Daughters of the American Revolution** or **Sons of the American Revolution**. These two organizations have designated persons in each chapter to help prospective members assemble their documentation. All Mershon descendants qualify for membership in **Descendants of Founders of New Jersey**. Lawrence Township Archives: Laura Nawrocik of the Mercer County Library Staff visited our meeting to introduce Dr. Brooke Hunter, Associate Dean, College of Arts and Sciences at Rider University. Dr. Hunter is also the Lawrence Township Historian, a voluntary position. Laura maintains the Lawrence Township Archives, located in a locked room at the library. Show and Tell: Dave Beun displayed the original 1738 Henry Mershon II stone grave maker. Dave salvaged this stone after the current grave marker boulder fell over in 2019. The 1925 concrete footing under the boulder was replaced. The original 1738 stone was embedded in the bottom of the 1925 footing. Dave had to chip the

concrete around the stone to release it. The 1738 stone will become part of the Lawrence Township Archives.

Clare Mershon displayed two photographs of a painting showing the W.C. Mershon sailing schooner, This ship was constructed at the shipyard of brothers William Condon⁷ Mershon and Daniel Smith⁷ Mershon, Jr., located on the Delaware River at Bordentown, NJ (see related article starting on page 4).

Harrison Hunt displayed his collection of Sherlock Holmes books published by The Mershon Company of Rahway, NJ. This publishing company was active from 1874 into the early 1900s. Our Treasurer, Joan Swearer, is descended from William Livingston Mershon, the founder of this company.

The livestream portion of our meeting ended at noon. Following box lunches, we resumed our meeting at 1:00 pm.

Minutes: The minutes of our 2021 virtual annual meeting were approved as printed.

Executive Board Report: We met at the Hampton Inn, Princeton, on Friday evening, July 22nd, 2022.

- We discussed having a special 2023 Annual Meeting and & Reunion to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Mershon Association. Details to be determined.
- We decided to offer the original 1738 Henry Mershon stone grave marker to the Lawrence Township Archives.
- With the assistance of Melissa Mershon, we are trying a hybrid in-person and online meeting this year. If hybrid meetings continue, Melissa recommends hiring video production students with professional equipment from a nearby university. We agreed this is a good idea.
- We reviewed proposed Mershon Constitution amendments. These amendments will be presented for approval by the members at this annual meeting.
- We discussed sponsoring a new contest to solicit Mershon family stories. No decision was reached.
- We agreed on a proposed slate of 2023 officer nominations.

Mershon Constitution Amendments: We voted to approve the proposed Mershon Constitution amendments sent to our membership with the June 21, 2022 Mershon News Bulletin. These amendments were originally proposed by Harrison Hunt and were developed in their final form by Harrison, Dave Beun and Jeff Mershon. We thank them for their work. The main purpose is to make our Mershon Association more likely to be approved for 501(c)(3) non-profit tax status by the IRS. Highlights of the amendments are:

- The name of our corporation is changed to "The Mershon Family Association, Inc."
- The Purposes of the Association are expanded to highlight the educational nature of our activities, state that our programs are open to the general public and we will not engage in political activities.
- Association membership can include any person interested in promoting the purposes of our Association, even if they are not a lineal Mershon descendant or a Mershon adoptee.
- A new Article VII is added to cover would happen in event of dissolution. Assets shall be distributed for one or more exempt purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

W.C. Mershon Schooner* Painting

Did you know there was a Mershon shipyard during the mid-1800s at Bordentown, NJ, seven miles south of Trenton?

Bill Craig, owner of a Philadelphia architecture firm named Mershon Design, contacted me in June 2022 to share photographs of a large oil painting of the W.C. Mershon schooner, built at the Mershon shipyard. The unsigned painting is 47" wide x 34" high, including the frame.


Bill is a descendant of William Condon⁷ (W.C.) Mershon (1822-1891). As described by *Henry Mershon III and His Descendants*, 1953, pages 41 & 42, W.C. and his brother Daniel Smith⁷ (D.S.) Mershon, Jr., operated a shipyard on the Delaware River at Bordentown.

*Schooner: A ship with two or more masts, all of which are fore-and-aft-rigged, the mainmast being abaft of and taller than the foremast. American Heritage Dictionary Λ

The W.C. Mershon schooner was built at the Mershon shipyard. Internet ship records say the W.C. Mershon schooner was launched in 1855. The ship hull was 138' long x 28' wide. The W.C. Mershon was engaged in coastal trade along the middle Atlantic states. It was active during the Civil War supplying Union outposts. A March 26, 1862 *New York Times* front-page article titled "*News from the Gulf*" reports the W.C. Mershon was at Union-held Fort Pickens (near Pensacola, Florida). ShipIndex.org reports the W.C. Mershon was still active in 1871.

Bordentown 1682-1976, a book compiled by the Bordentown Area Bicentennial Committee and Bordentown Historical Society, page 85, says that beginning in 1848, the Mershon shippard built the schooner Mary Mershon (Mary was the mother of W.C. and D.S. Mershon), the D.S. Mershon, the W.C. Mershon, the Joseph W. Allen and the Wm. A Newell.

During the Civil War, the Mershon shipyard received contracts to build two U.S. Navy gunboats. The first was the USS Cimarron, launched at Bordentown on March 16, 1862. All the ship building was performed at Bordentown. This gunboat was 208' long x 35' wide. It was propelled by side paddlewheels and was double-ended for operating on rivers. It was outfitted for military service at the Philadelphia Navy Yard and commissioned on July 5, 1862. The second gunboat was the USS Mingoe, launched at Bordentown on August 6, 1863. It was similar to the Cimarron, but added iron cladding

above the water line on the wooden sides to protect the crew. Only the hull and some additional fittings were constructed at Bordentown. The rest of the ship building was performed by others at Wilmington, Delaware. The ship was commissioned on July 29, 1864. The Mershon shipvard later built the tug Union and the schooners Buckeye and Edmund S. Watson.

Sharon and I visited Bordentown the day after the 2022 Mershon reunion in Lawrenceville, but we didn't notice any visible trace of the Mershon shipyard. Several months later, I talked with Sally Garrison Thomas of Venice, FL, a D.S. Mershon descendant who grew up in Bordentown. Sally believes the shipyard was near the train station, adjacent to the train tracks that follow the Delaware River.



John⁵ and Jane (Lindsey) Gardner Mershon Portraits

John⁵, Aaron⁴, Peter³, Henry II, Henri

Paul Sheirich of San Leandro, CA, registered on our Mershon website in February 2023. Paul has two 1850 oil paintings on canvas showing his ancestors John and Jane (Lindsey) Gardner Mershon. John was 77 years old at the time, and Jane was 61 (as recorded on the back of the paintings). Paul also has a 1850 painting on wood showing their home near West Springfield, Erie County, PA. John and Jane's home was located in the NW corner of Pennsylvania, three miles east of the Ohio state border and three miles south of Lake Erie. All three paintings are by Garret S. Rice of Warren, PA.

Jane (Lindsey) Gardner Mershon 1789-1855

As described in *Peter Mershon* and his Descendants, 1952, John was three years old when his father Aaron⁴ Mershon was killed in the American Revolutionary War during the Battle of Long Island on August 27, 1776. Aaron was serving in the First Hunterdon County (NJ) Militia Regiment. Later, the family home near Princeton was burned by British soldiers. John and his older sister Jane⁵ were largely raised in their Uncle Daniel4 Mershon's home.

John left New Jersey in 1796 and settled in Erie County, PA. He married Bathsheba Brush in 1799. They had 12 children together until Bathsheba's death in 1817. John remarried in 1818 to Jane (Lindsey) Gardner, a widow with two young children. John and Jane had five more children together. You can see John's family chart in *Peter Mershon and His Descendants*, page 35. Paul Sheirich is descended from John and Jane's youngest child, Ora Bathsheba⁶ Mershon.



Elias James⁵ Mershon, Charles H. & Jane Eliza⁶ (Mershon) Brower Portraits

Jane Eliza⁶, Elias James⁵, James⁴, Thomas³, Henry II, Henri

Christopher Beach of La Jolla, CA, has three portraits of his ancestors Elias James Mershon, Charles Homan & Jane Eliza (Mershon) Brower. Elias was Jane's father. The portraits of Charles & Jane (Mershon) Brower were dated by the artist, Conrad Highwood of Chicago, IL, in 1863 and 1864 respectively.

As recorded in *Thomas Mershon and His Descendants and Daughters of Henry II*, 1957, pages 43-45, Elias was born in New Jersey. His father died in an accident when Elias was 12. Elias went to live with his older brother Robert's family near Rochester, NY. In 1826, he married Hannah Southwick in Rochester. Elias and Hannah had three sons and one daughter, all born in the Rochester vicinity.

Elias moved his family to Saginaw, Michigan, in about 1850. There were extensive pine forests to be harvested in northern Michigan. Elias established the first lumber planning mill in Saginaw according to the autobiography of his grandson, William Butts Mershon.

Jane Eliza Mershon married Charles H. Brower in 1855. Jane and Charles had one son and four daughters. Christopher Beach is descended from their daughter Mary Hannah Brower.

Christopher writes: The Mershon name has a powerful hold on many of us, even when descendants have 'lost' Mershon as their family name. My mother (Jane Eliza's great-granddaughter) was Jane Mershon Baker and my sister (Jane Eliza's great-great-granddaughter) is Mershon Beach. In this line of our family, the descendants have found every way to keep the name of Mershon alive.

Please note that several people are currently listed as "pending" to join our group because they have not answered the membership questions yet.

For privacy reasons, our Genealogist does not release information on living persons outside your immediate family (grandparents, parents, siblings, children, spouses) without their written consent, unless the subject persons would be over 110 years old. This is the guideline followed by the <u>ancestry.com</u> genealogy website.
